Greetings from the Dean...

Hello, all you creative people!

At the March meeting hosted by board member Karen Longwell at St. Columbanus in Cortlandt Manor we heard original members' compositions that were enjoyable for many reasons. They were sing-able, practical in the worship service or for special occasions, and showed a wide range of styles and difficulty. From Eileen Laurence we heard a tribute to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. for SATB choir and bell choir, plus a setting of the Irish Blessing (see below). We enjoyed singing Judith Abel's "I Am Thankful" for two-part choir and organ, and her inspired solo, "Simple Truth." Karen Longwell sang my "Nazarene Magnificat" written for a divinity student/dancer, and I must say Karen made it sound pretty good! Frank Miller brought an SATB setting of Psalm 86, "Sing" - a rhythmically exciting and dissonant SATB choral work with organ accompaniment, and a rollicking "The Closer I Get to Heaven" in a gospel-style choral arrangement. Dr. Robert Chase presented his vocal solo "May the Words" and "Two Solemn Responses," which he invited us to freely use in our own worship services (thank you, Bob!) Kenneth Potter brought his hymn, "This is the Hour of Banquet and of Song," appropriate for communion Sundays, and Edwin Wallace closed our program with several of his organ compositions. I always say, a good song is worth a million bucks, and all these compositions were great! We hope to share much of this music at our next meeting in April. Thank you to everyone who participated! and a special thank you to Karen, who provided a very bounteous repast.

NEW MUSIC FOR YOUR CONGREGATION'S CHOIRS: <u>AGO Choral Reading Session on Sunday, April 22, 2012</u> @ 4 PM (Larchmont Temple)

You are invited to attend a choral reading session, co-sponsored by our Westchester Chapter AGO and Larchmont Temple (Hosts: Cantor Fredda Mendelson and Organist Jayson Rodovsky-Engquist) on Sunday afternoon, April 22, 2012. The program begins at 4 p.m. (and will last approximately 90 minutes). Ten publishers have agreed to supply copies of their top 3-5 new anthems for us to read through. They will include anthems for SATB, SSA and a couple for children's voice (possibly in 2 or 3 parts). Members of the Fairfield West Chapter AGO have been invited to attend and help boost our choir sections so we have enough good choral singers on each part. If you know of good sight readers in your congregational choirs, you might consider asking them to attend, also.

The sanctuary seats 300, so there should be plenty of room. The first 75 Westchester AGO members to arrive will be given a complimentary packet of music from these publishers (approximately 45-50 new anthems). This is a wonderful way to find new choral music. And, remember, you can often use an anthem, originally composed in 4-parts for your specific situation if you only have 2 parts. The accompanist is often able to "fill out" the remaining harmonies. Always think creatively when you are at a reading session. You may even discover new pieces appropriate for a community-based choral festival and invite congregations from your own village, town or city to participate. Sharing choral music is one of the best ways to get together with other musicians and create a meaningful experience together. Individually, we can only sing one part, but collectively the results can be amazing! As all of us know, studies have shown how many aspects of one's life can be increased by being a part of a choir, on a regular basis. Chorus America reports singers make better leaders, better committee and board members, they are more philanthropic and tend to be better-informed about all kinds of world news and situations. And, the positive aspects of singing include deep breathing and a good amount of oxygen entering your system during a rehearsal or performance.

We have requested Psalm-based anthems or anthems appropriate for interfaith use for this choral reading session.

LARCHMONT TEMPLE is located in the Manor Section of Larchmont Village. Designed in the 1880's by Frederick Law Olmstead (the designer of New York's Central Park), the 280-acre section of Larchmont Manor (where the temple is located) is a lovely section of Larchmont Village with Victoria-style mansions dating from this time. A 13-acre walking park is located directly on Long Island Sound, if you happen to arrive early and is open to the public and within walking distance to the temple.

<u>DIRECTIONS/ADDRESS</u>: Larchmont Temple is located at <u>75 Larchmont Avenue</u>, south of the Boston Post Road in Larchmont's "Manor" section. From the intersection of Post Road and Larchmont Avenue, you proceed south from the traffic light (towards Long Island Sound) for several blocks to the corner of Larchmont and Willow. The building is a Georgian-style (red brick) sanctuary on the corner.

<u>PARKING</u>: street parking is available on all surrounding streets in the Manor. There is no parking lot. Park anywhere you can and walk to the Sanctuary. The SIDE ENTRANCE (Willow Ave) has handicapped access with a ramp. An elevator is located inside (down the long hallway from side entrance) and will take you to the Sanctuary level, should you need one.

THE NOSEY DEAN ASKS:

Although some denominations and individual houses of worship show strength in their numbers, many congregations have shrunk, even to closing. What are some ways that we as professional musicians and ministers of music, who love our work, can help to reverse this trend?

Ken Potter: Filling the Church/Filling the Choir

When I started writing this, I found myself filling a page with all the negative things that are affecting church/choir membership in America. It became such an exercise in futility that I deleted everything I had written. After all, we all know the reasons – we've lived through the changes.

Just a few ideas:

To maintain a choir the director really does need to be the "Pied Piper." He or she needs to keep the choir a welcoming place that is truly an enjoyable experience for its members. The music chosen needs to be interesting enough that the choir will want to sing it, with enough variety to make sure there's something to appeal to everyone. The organ needs to be in good shape to provide an inspiring accompaniment, not just give everyone a headache. The director (that's me) needs to not have a superior attitude where he is the expert and the choir is basically taking up his time until he can get the cathedral job he dreams about.

Having tried to accomplish all of the above, it can still be an enormous challenge to keep choir sections filled. At Scarborough, we have terrific women's sections. I would even dare even use the term "world class." It's the men's sections that are hard to keep filled. World Class singers certainly, but just not enough of them to keep the choir balanced. If we had two more tenors and two more basses, I would think I had gone to heaven. As it is, I am often singing whichever part is missing that week, and still trying to play the organ, sometimes not to good effect! It's hard to be the only person singing your part, and very few can manage that without becoming very unhappy. There is strength (safety?) in numbers! Last week we did the

beautiful four part Nicholas White arrangement of "Steal Away." There was not a single male singer in the loft, so I attempted to sing bass and tenor, jumping from one to the other to fill in notes needed to best complete the harmony. It reminded me of Anna Russell singing a quartet on a comedy record she made years ago. That said, I just about burst with pride over what a good group I get to direct every Sunday, and am awed by their continuing dedication to singing good music.

Scarborough currently pays one soprano and one bass, but the bass is only budgeted for 30 weeks a year, which is why January has been bass-less.

I've always been fascinated by the concept of endowed "chairs" in the choir given to cover the cost of hired singers. A singer at \$75 a service is \$3,000 per year based on 40 services a year. I wonder if any choirs have ever done that?

When the church membership grows significantly, chances are that either a few of those will join the choir, or their added (generous?) pledges will help cover the cost of hiring singers. John Finley Williamson, the founder of Westminster Choir College always told his students that the choir, if you are successful, will have 10% of the total number of congregants in the pews. Using this formula, I should feel very successful, considering that we always have at least 10%, and there have been a few Sundays where we neared 100%. That doesn't help the fact that we still need men desperately. We need to grow the congregation to provide a larger field from which to snatch my 10%. Hmm? Is that a "human tithe?"

The church I grew up in had very successful "Each One Bring One" Sundays every year. It was a fun time where everyone introduced their friends and a nice luncheon followed the service. No attempt was made to pressure these guests into becoming members, but the fact was that every time we did it we'd get, on average, one or two new families, previously unchurched. That's two families a year that wouldn't have joined otherwise. If, at the end of 10 years, 20 families were added, it starts to look like a big success.

Finally: Singing can prevent colds! 11 years ago, the University of California at Irvine, did some research where they swabbed the mouths of singers in the Pacific Chorale who were performing the Beethoven "Missa Solemnis." They found that after rehearsals levels of Immunoglobulin A, a protein that stimulates the immune system to fight disease, increased 150% by the end of rehearsals. It increased 240% during the performance. I'm not making this up. Google it! Then join the choir for the health benefits....

Tim Keenan-Devlin: One thing is to give an organ recital to help benefit the church in trying to get more congregants.

Alice Avouris: That is a really great idea, Tim! Thank you, Ken, for your letter – it shows you can have fun, even with challenges! Thank you to everyone else whose contributions we included in the past two *Trompettes*: Jimrae Lenser, Gerald Montagna, Rick Tripodi, Eileen Laurence, Debbie Moran, Doris Dubac and Matthew Phelps.
