Greetings from the Dean...

Last month's choral reading at the Larchmont Temple was a whirlwind tour of music for different voices, on texts useful for Christian and Jewish worship. Host and Temple organist and choir director **Jayson Rodovsky-Engquist** kept the 25 or 30 of us on our toes as we sight read through most of the 50 excellent anthems, some of which were quite challenging! It was a lot of fun. **Douglas Kostner** (one of the featured composers) and David Johnson (from Connecticut) were the accompanists, and Cantor Fredda Mendelson from Larchmont Temple also participated. Participants left with packets thick as phone books and helpful catalogues of music that one would really like to use (and hear) in our houses of worship. I can't thank Jayson enough (and his musical team) for his dedication and huge amount of preparation to make this event a success. Sub-Dean **Judy Abel** and Director-Elect **Ed Wallace** also brought a few of their compositions to share.

This past year, although partially thwarted by bad weather in October, we looked at professional concerns: among them, how we deal with input from clergy and others at our houses of worship. We feel frustration when musical styles conflict or traditional music is lost. Musicians like us take it personally. The question is, should we really yearn for a situation where the musical sophistication of our congregation is identical to our own? Might it not be still our duty to share the best music that we possibly can? Meanwhile, we learn patience, turning the other cheek, learning to appreciate what is good in a modern worship service, and sprouting angel's wings!

Lately I spoke with three of our working organists who shared some details of their musical life with me. **Helene Hinte** is currently playing for three congregations, each having their own special musical sources and traditions. **Carolyn Karlsrud** has a busy weekend coming up, substituting for 5 or 6 services. **Terry Kelly** called to donate an entire library of choral music to anyone interested, as the church where he currently plays will be shutting down, and he fears it will all be thrown away. (*Please see the announcement below.*) I know there's not a Westchester AGO member reading this who does not admire and rejoice with Helene and Carolyn, and feel the heartbreak of Terry.

Last thoughts: Spring has arrived, and being outdoors is a delight, especially in the early morning with all the birds singing their individual songs. I'm lucky to live near the North County Trailway, a great place to get some exercise and clear the brain. Each spring I get to reacquaint myself with different bird songs. One of my favorites is that of the veery, a member of the thrush family (like the nightingale) whose call sounds exactly like pan pipes played in descending loops. Lately there has been a veery calling from the across the road beyond the bike path, the distance making the sound even more ethereal.

We have our territories, and the birds have theirs, and we both establish ourselves through music. The birds call mostly in the morning, when they want everyone to know that this is where they plan to find food, mate and raise a family. They are persistent. So should we be! If we want people to know who we are as musicians we need to practice, play our best and keep calling repeatedly, ethereally.

Directions to The Osborn Retirement Community

From the north:

Take the Sprain Pkwy or Route 684 south to I-287 East.

Merge onto I-95 South via exit 12 toward New York. 1.4 miles

Take the Playland Parkway exit 19 toward Rye/Harrison. 0.3 miles

Stay straight to go onto Playland Parkway. 0.2 miles

Take the first right onto Playland Access Dr. .03 miles

Turn right to stay on Playland Access Dr. 0.1 miles

Take the first left onto Theall Rd. 0.2 miles. The Osborn is on the left.

From the south:

Get on the Hutchinson River Pkwy north, and take exit 23 S toward Mamaroneck. Merge onto I-95 N/New England Thway toward Connecticut. 3.1 miles Take the Playland Parkway exit 19 toward Rye/Harrison. 0.3 miles Turn slight right onto Playland Parkway. 0.2 miles Take the first right onto Playland Access Dr. . 03 miles Turn right to stay on Playland Access Dr. . 0.1 miles Take the first left onto Theall Rd. 0.2 miles. The Osborn is on the left.

Directions to The Wartburg Adult Care Community from The Osborn

Start out going northeast on Theall Rd toward Playland Access Dr. 0.2 miles
Turn left onto Playland Access Dr. .08 miles
Turn right onto Theodore Fremd Ave. 0.2 miles
Take the first left onto North St. 1.0 miles
Turn right onto North St./Route 127 1.3 miles
Merge onto Hutchinson River Parkway South via the ramp on the left. 8.4 miles
Take exit 12 toward East Lincoln Ave./Pelham/Mount Vernon. .08 miles
Turn right onto Wilson Woods Park Rd. .05 miles
Take the first left onto East Lincoln Ave. .06 miles
Take first right onto Station Place. .09 miles
Turn slight right onto Wartburg Place. .01 miles The Wartburg is on the left.

Or, if you can't attend The Osborn part of the program and want to go directly to The Warburg, use the following directions from their website:

Take the Hutchinson River Parkway to exit 12. The Wartburg is located just off Exit 12 of the Hutchinson River Parkway (East Lincoln Avenue, Mount Vernon/Pelham).

Southbound: Bear right at STOP sign, then left at TRAFFIC LIGHT (East Lincoln Avenue). Turn right at next TRAFFIC LIGHT, Wartburg Place (labeled as Station Place on some area maps). Proceed straight 2 blocks to Gatehouse.

Northbound: Bear left at STOP sign, then left at TRAFFIC LIGHT (East Lincoln Avenue). Turn right at second TRAFFIC LIGHT, Wartburg Place (labeled as Station place on some area maps). Proceed straight 2 blocks to Gatehouse.
