I don't think you had to be Catholic to be surprised by the news of Pope Benedict's resignation. I thought of one of my old choir members, who quietly approached me after a September rehearsal to tell me that he didn't think he could handle solos any more. I'd already come to that conclusion, and I was dreading the conversation (he'd owned *O Holy Night* since before I was born), but John made it very easy for me by recognizing it himself. He continued to sing with us, as a very valuable member of the choir, until his death a few years later. That's a rare quality, to know when to step aside, - a quality I hope to find inside myself when the time comes (*many* years from now, please God) that I should get off the bench for the last time. I pray we will all know when that time comes, and that we will always be supportive of our colleagues and choir members who are making, or have already made, such a decision.

We have no meeting in March, because this is such a busy season for so many of us, as we prepare for Lent and Holy Week and Easter Sunday, with special services and concerts, and special music at "regular" services. May your music be an inspiration to your congregations. To those who do not celebrate these feasts, may the coming of spring warm you inside and out. And to all of you, Happy St. Patrick's Day!

ENOCH World Premiere!

by Dan Montez (artistic director, Taconic opera)

Enoch, father of Methuselah, mysteriously disappeared in the book of Genesis with little explanation. His book, mentioned in many canonical and apocryphal texts, was recently unearthed and translated from Aramaic, Geez and Hebrew. The over 100 chapter book, originally considered scripture by both Jews and Christians, was lost for almost 2000 years. Surprisingly, scholars found it to be the most quoted book in the New Testament, as many as 128 times. The compelling story of Enoch finally has an oratorio! The composer, Dan Montez, will conduct the world premiere of this work on the first weekend of March, 2013 in Ossining and White Plains, NY. Full orchestra, chorus and soloists of Taconic Opera.

The concert program includes Beethoven's well-known Fifth Symphony, as a textbook example of what can be done with the symphony orchestra, and Dvořák's less well-known Symphonic Variations, as a different example of the range of symphonic expression. Of the Dvořák Kramer says "It's is a remarkable piece: It contains a theme, 25 variations, and a fugue all in the space of about 23 minutes, and those 25 variations explore about as diverse a range of styles and moods as could be imagined by a compser at that time: You find touches of Beethoven, Brahms, Wagner, Johann Strauss, and of course Dvořák himself, and his own manner of evoking folk music styles."

Regarding Beethoven's Fifth, Kramer says "It's a standard work which many of us know almost too well. But I intend to play it in a different way than I've ever heard it before: The message is the same, but the presentation will be quite different."

Collegium Westchester Chorus and Orchestra is modeled on the 17th century Collegium Musicum in that it combines active professional and accomplished avocational musicians into one ensemble, performing music composed from the 17th century to the present. Its instrumentalists and singers come from the northern New York City metropolitan area. Director Eric Kramer has conducted groups

including the S.C.S. Sorrento Classica Festival Symphony Orchestra, Berlin Sinfonietta, Opéra National de Lyon, Budapest Festival Orchestra, and Bronx Opera.

The organ, built by Midmer, has the largest number of pipes of any organ, in the world, since the lower two keyboards each have 88 notes (like a piano) -- hence more pipes than a normal 61 (or 50-something) note organ console keyboard. Also, it has a 7-manual console. The ballroom contains an additional separate and distinct pipe organ (with theater-style curved keyboard) built by the Kimball Organ Company."

The Westfield Center Keyboard Competition and Academy offers young keyboard players the opportunity to explore the music of the 17th, 18th and 19th centuries through the avenue of instruments, sources and performance practices familiar to the composer. In 2011, Westfield held the first-ever North American international competition in fortepiano (at Cornell University), and in 2012 a competition in harpsichord (at the Smithsonian Institution). The 2013 Organ Competition, at Cornell and the Eastman School of Music, invites organists from around the world to perform on 3 landmark historic, and historically-informed instruments, before an international jury and for significant prizes. Under the rubric "Cosmopolitan Encounters" the focus is on the 18th century but moves far beyond.

The Competition (September 22-29) will run alongside the academy (September 24-30), as well as the annual EROI festival (September 26-29). Competition participants eliminated after the first round will be invited to join the Academy and festival. Deadline for applications is May 1, 2013.
