Directions from the Cross-Westchester Expressway (287):

FROM EAST: Going West on 287, take Exit 9N-S toward the Hutchinson Parkway/Merritt Parkway/Whitestone Bridge. Proceed on Westchester Avenue and take the Hutchinson Parkway Exit 9S toward the Whitestone Bridge. Then take the RT-127 N Exit, (Exit 25) toward White Plains. Turn right onto North Street. Turn left onto Bryant Avenue, and continue straight through the intersection at Mamaroneck Avenue. Continue up the hill and the Church will be on your left..

FROM WEST: Going East on 287, take Exit 9A toward Brewster, but bear right onto Westchester Avenue. Turn right onto Bryant Avenue. Here is a message from the presenter of this event, Dr. Jan-Piet Knijff:

"This will be a one-day workshop for organists who are interested in earning Professional Certification from the American Guild of Organists. Even if you don't want to take an AGO exam but are simply interested in developing keyboard skills, learning some basic music-theoretical concepts, and getting new ideas about learning a piece from the repertoire, this will hopefully be a day well spent.

"Depending on the participants interest and level of study (Service Playing Certificate, Colleague, Associate, Fellow...), we will work on such skills as

- harmonization;
- transposition;
- improvisation;
- · learning a piece.

"It would be great to have a handful (or more!) active participants, who are willing to work with the instructor at the keyboard. You can bring things you've been working on on your own (or even with a teacher), but there will be plenty of material to try-out on the spot. If you like to work on a piece of literature that's required for one of the current exams, please bring a bunch of photocopies so that everybody in the workshop has access to a score as we work on it.

"Active participants please contact the instructor beforehand, preferably by email (The instructor, Dr. Jan-Piet Knijff, is a Fellow of the AGO. He has won the Associate and Fellowship prizes as well as the S. Lewis Elmer for his work at both advanced levels. In addition, Dr. Knijff holds the Artist Diploma/MM from the Conservatory of Amsterdam as well as the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the CUNY Graduate Center, where he also completed coursework for the PhD in musicology. He has taught organ and harpsichord at the undergraduate, graduate, and post-graduate level, both at the Copland School of Music at Queens College/CUNY and privately. In addition, he teaches Latin, Ancient Greek, and Beginning Italian. He has previously taught workshops on Buxtehude, Mendelssohn, Messiaen, and 20th -Century Dutch composers for AGO chapters from Virginia to Dutchess County.)

William Byrd's Eight Reasons for Singing (1588)

- 1. It is a knowledge easely taught and quickly learned, where there is a good Master and an apt Scoller.
- 2. The exercise of singing is delightfull to Nature and good to preserve the health of Man.
- 3. It doth strengthen all parts of the brest, and doth open the pipes.
- 4. It is a singular good remedie for stammering in the speech.
- 5. It is the best meanes to procure a perfect pronunciation, and to make a good Orator.
- 6. It is the onely way to know where Nature hath bestowed the benefit of a good voyce; which guift is so rare as there is not one among a thousand that hath it; and in many that excellent guift is lost because they want Art to express Nature.
- 7. There is not any Musicke of Instruments whatsoever comparable to that which is made of the voyces of men, where the voyces are good and the same well sorted and ordered.
- 8. The better the voyce is, the meter it is to honour and serve God therewith; and the voyce of man is chiefely to be employed to that ende.

Since singing is so good a thing, I wish all men would learne to sing.
