From the Dean's Bench

Hi Everyone! Greetings! First, a look back at the Summer passed . . .

Several of us were privileged to hear the artistry of Lana Kollath at St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Church in Shrub Oak, June 18th. The recital, played on piano entirely from memory, was a beautiful example of the freedom of expression possible when one has the amazing technique, power of concentration and range of interpretation that she has. This was very well attended by her enthusiastic parish -- a wonderful example of what a blessing it can be to work for a church with a supportive pastor!

This recital helped prepare me for the performances we heard at the AGO National Convention, which sub-dean Judy Abel described so well in the last *Trompette*. David Higgs (chair of the organ department at Eastman) also played from memory, with complete joie de vivre, but I was equally impressed by his awesome abilities as by his poise at the microphone in between selections. It would be so much more understandable if he were a klutz and forgot to turn the mike off, or something! Almost two months have passed since that concert, and my most memorable moment is still What a Friend We Have in Jesus by William Bolcom. The second biggest impression on me was the classically-improvised service performed by Matthew Glandorf at The Mount St. Sepulchre Franciscan Monastery. It's not as though we felt we were hearing a reincarnation of J. S. Bach, but perhaps one of Bach's contemporaries when he played a four-part fugue. It really started me thinking. Before music was written down, we church musicians were always making it up! -- like jazz musicians do today, and of course still do in the gospel music tradition. I'm sure there are many of you out there improvising -who maybe never stopped experimenting with your own chords on the piano, playing for fun as well as practicing your lessons. For so many years my mind has been focused on the impossible goal of playing notes perfectly on a page, -- not my notes, -- someone else's. We will always have the great composers, but maybe music is not only learning about their genius. Maybe we lose some of the heart of music when we forget how to 'play.'

Now, a look ahead to Fall! Please see the calendar of programs, mark yours and stick it on the *fridge*. (You know what I mean.) You will not want to miss anything! At our first meeting, September 26th at Hitchcock Presbyterian in Scarsdale, guest speaker Karla Diamond will teach us all about *The Alexander Technique for Organists*.

His solution is not as difficult as you might think. Today, there are several active schools teaching his principles to dancers, musicians and other artists, which are relevant to everyone. Several members of the AGO Board have been enthusiastic students of Karla Diamond. Join us in learning more about the Alexander Technique and how it can help our performance and that of our students. PEDALS, PIPES AND PIZZA

If we want the pipe organ to survive and thrive, we need to introduce it to children and youth while they still have the curiosity and enthusiasm. If you have an organ pipe we might borrow for the day, or any other ideas, please share them with us. Let's begin right now to mention the date and urge our music students to attend. Interview with an Organist . . .

Recent AGO board member Lowell Knauer has been organist at St. Ann's Roman Catholic Church in Ossining since 1985. He received his degree in organ performance with a minor in harpsichord from Penn State University, where he studied under June Miller. In a brief 'virtual' (internet) interview Lowell was kind enough to share something of himself with me over a nice frozen coffee drink. At least, that's what I'm drinking; I don't know about Lowell

Alice Avouris: Lowell, when did you begin playing the organ?

Lowell Knauer: I started playing the piano in 2nd grade, and had to wait until 7th grade to take organ lessons because my legs couldn't reach the pedals until then!

Alice : That's a problem; isn't it? Someone should invent a $\frac{1}{4}$ sized 'Suzuki' organ! Based on your experience, do you have any favorite words of advice for beginning organists?

Lowell : Don't look at the pedals trying to find the notes . . .

Alice : You mean, that could become a crutch, and postpone educating the feet to where the pedals lie. Thanks -- I need to be reminded of that! Do you play other instruments, and what is your favorite?

Lowell : Personally, I like playing the organ the most. During high school, I was in the marching band and drum and bugle corps, playing soprano cornet. I really enjoyed the marching competitions. Organists generally don't have the opportunity to do that! *Alice* : That's for sure!

Lowell : At my small high school in Pennsylvania, out of the 400 students in grades 9 to 12, 180 were in the band – almost half the school!

Alice : That is music played by a community; the social aspect reinforces the music, and *vice versa*. Like congregational hymn-singing, except that at your school marching band was obviously the cool thing to do! Wish we had that enthusiasm in all of our churches! Okay, now I want to ask a difficult question: What was your most embarrassing moment playing the organ? We'll keep it to ourselves (fingers crossed).

Lowell: I was playing a wedding at a church in Pennsylvania and before the wedding started, I spent a few minutes getting familiar with the organ. There was a black button under the console that I thought was a button to ring the chimes, so I pressed it a few times I didn't hear anything (no chimes, no bells) so I thought it must be disconnected. About five minutes later there were police sirens in the church parking lot and the police came inside the church. It turns out that black button directly summons the police and the church had it installed at the organ a few years earlier because there were a number of families that got into fist fights in the church during funerals! Whew!

Alice: Thanks for the warning! Thanks for the interview, Lowell, and welcome aboard!

Notice Informing Membership of Case in Progress

On July 24, 2010 an AGO Member filed a formal complaint against All Saints Church in Harrison, NY for wrongful termination of employment. The Guild is investigating the matter according to the AGO's Procedures for Dealing with Complaints about Termination. No determination has been made at this time. Although Guild Members may provide substitute or interim services, no Member may seek or accept regular or permanent employment with All Saints Church while these Procedures are pending.
