### From the Dean's Bench

#### **Greetings from the Dean**

#### A look back at our September meeting:

Eighteen Chapter members attended our first program, "The Alexander Technique for Organists," where Karla Diamond's demonstration went beyond expectations. Just from her simple verbal direction, I could feel how the neck can balance on the top of the spine, freeing up the back and letting the chest expand and breathe. We watched while she gently influenced several members to move effortlessly into and out of the chair. From feeling the balance of our necks, to balancing in the chair, we then went to balance ourselves on the organ bench. Thank you to those who sent in their comments. They ranged from admiration of the founder, F. Matthias Alexander, who was able to correct his own physical negative habits, to appreciating the mental and physical spontaneity that was shown by Karla. Karla also emphasized the importance of taking time to breathe, to relax and enjoy our music.

#### Four manuals, 325 ranks, 576 stops, 20,142 pipes

A short two weeks later, and we were enjoying a beautiful afternoon at West Point. On October 10<sup>th</sup>, 18 members and friends met at the Old Cadet Chapel, situated in the cemetery of West Point Military Academy, and were given a fascinating talk about the history of the building by Mr. Craig Williams, organist, choirmaster and essentially curator of the 5 pipe organs at the WPMA. This introduction to the life of a busy headorganist at our country's most famous military school, which involves 600 performances per year (!) (and he had played 4 weddings on Saturday) made us wonder – how did he make time for us? Craig was so enthusiastic, it's clear that he enjoyed sharing with other organists all the facets of his work. After a beautiful performance by Mr. Williams of *Toccata* by Nancy Plummer Faxon on the 2-manual Wicks organ, we moved up the hill to the magnificent Cadet Chapel. Of course, 'chapel' is a little misleading; like the 'chapel' at Princeton University, this is a beautiful, Gothic-styled building with gorgeous stained glass windows and banners hanging all up and down the aisles. We heard more wonderful playing by Mr. Williams – a Bach chorale prelude, the hymn-tune *Diademata*, Marcel Dupré's *Carillon*, and to show off the organ's broad spectrum of orchestral colors - Dvorak's "Goin' Home" from the New World Symphony. Then it was our turn to experience playing that delightful, giant whale of an instrument! I'm proud to say that myself, Virginia Bender, John Cecconi, Bob Chase, Richard Grafke, Jeffrey Hoffman, Lowell Knauer, and Edwin Wallace all threw caution

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to the winds and put our bottoms on the bench. I absolutely loved it. That Möller instrument feels alive in a way that the electric organ at my church simply doesn't. Along with music from our morning services we heard an original composition played by Edwin Wallace and a piece by Benjamin Britten for organ played by Jeffrey Hoffman.

As fun as that was, there were more treats in store. After a tour of the organ shop we single-filed up a winding stair to the pipe chests, where the seven or so big, 32-foot pipes lay slung, hanging against the stone wall. After squeezing by these, we wound up in a side balcony overlooking the cathedral (I mean chapel) where one could see pipes peeking out of other balconies all down the aisles. Craig had demonstrated how the sound could come from the front, the middle, the back or all three areas. There was even an overlooked harpsichord in one balcony-bay!

After stumbling over our thanks to Craig Williams, the most generous and busiest organist imaginable, we journeyed back down to Highland Falls where eight of us enjoyed Chinese food (actually ordered in Chinese, thanks to Bob Chase.) We were very hungry.

Following a motion approved by the AGO National Council, the AGO Committee on Professional Networking and Public Relations is pleased to forward the following letter from Pipedreams host and producer Michael Barone to all AGO members.

To all AGO Chapter Deans and Newsletter Editors:

(Please share this information widely with your members.)

Plenty remains for us all to do to celebrate and promote awareness of the King of Instruments. Please forgive the 'mass mail' format of this communication. I would like to offer a suggestion that I encourage you to share with all of your AGO chapter members.

Though we might imagine that, after 28+ years on the air, American Public Media's PIPEDREAMS is a known quantity to everyone, in reality it's not. And even though the internet offers a convenient, time-independent access point for online PIPEDREAMS listening (18,500 discrete users monthly), the largest audience by far is reached through radio broadcast transmissions (over 220,000 weekly).

*You* can help increase awareness of the country's only nationally distributed organ music radio broadcast...and, in doing so, increase public awareness of and interest in

organ music! Simply include some basic promotional information in available cost-free outlets. Think of this action as being as important as listing the date and time of your own performance event in a PR release.

Where/When? In any and every program you print for any local organ recital you sponsor or perform; also in church bulletins or newsletters, particularly in a week for which you are planning some special organ music. Make this a regular 'insertion,' so that the message has a chance to 'sink in.'

**What?** Consider a *brief* paragraph, something like these (below), <u>if you live somewhere that weekly</u> PIPEDREAMS broadcast can be heard on radio:

Enjoy organ music in its infinite variety each week with PIPEDREAMS from American Public Media, heard [day, time, station call-letters, frequency and city]. For more information: [local station web address]. Also listen to PIPEDREAMS on the internet at any time (24/7) at www.pipedreams.org.

**OR:** Enjoy organ music on your radio during weekly broadcasts of PIPEDREAMS from American Public Media, heard [day, time, station call-letters, frequency and city]. For more information: [local station web address]. Also listen to PIPEDREAMS on the internet at any time (24/7) at www.pipedreams.org.

**OR**...<u>if you live in an unfortunately 'PIPEDREAMS-free'</u> zone:

Enjoy organ music in its infinite variety on PIPEDREAMS from American Public Media, available online at any time (24/7). Each week a new two-hour program appears on the website, and hundreds of past broadcasts are infinitely accessible in the PIPEDREAMS program archive at www.pipedreams.org.

Why? Take nothing for granted. People interested in the organ music you play may not know about

PIPEDREAMS. And people who listen to PIPEDREAMS may well be among the people who show up for your performances...it's a win-win situation.

**How?** Find local station information online at: www.pipedreams.org/stations.

Remember, too, that your local public radio station is likely to continue broadcasts of PIPEDREAMS <u>if the station</u>'s administration knows that you really listen and provide crucial membership support. When you pledge local station support, always mention PIPEDREAMS.

<u>Lacking feedback</u>, the station might be excused for thinking no one cares.

Lynne Hansen: Well, I hope all Lutherans are playing Ein' Feste Burg (or something equally appropriate) in honor of Reformation Day! And Hallowe'en wasn't originally a pagan holiday, y'know - it's just our modern society has made it so.

Eugene Lavery: Nothing Halloween themed. *Placare Christe servulis* from *Le Tombeau de Titelouze, Op. 38* by Marcel Dupré.

Tim Keenan-Devlin: I'm planning to play on Halloween "A Mighty Fortress" by Johann Pachebel, it being Reformation Day also. I'm going to play the first part of it as a Prelude and the last movement of it as a Postlude. I also plan on playing "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" by Dale Wood.

Rick Tripodi: I'm not playing anywhere on October 31<sup>st</sup>, BUT (obvious choice: *Toccata & Fugue in D minor* – Bach). Seeing that it is also (in the liturgical church) the Vigil of All Saints on November 1st: *Incantation pour un Jour Saint* (which translates into *Incantation for a Saints Day*) by Langlais.

Philip Auman Godlewski: We anticipate the Feast of All Saints on Sunday 31 October at my parish church. I am playing all three movements of Jan Bender's "Fantasie on Sine Nomine" which he wrote for and dedicated to my organ professor at the former Wittenberg School of Music, Trudy Faber.

Lowell Knauer: On Halloween Sunday, for the postlude I usually play Bach's Toccata & Fugue in d minor. Some members of the congregation have commented that they "like that song from Phatom of the Opera"!

Joyce Gardner: I ignore Hallowe'en completely and just observe Reformation Sunday with "A Mighty Fortress", etc. Then the following week we observe All Saints with music of that nature.
