The Nosey Dean asks: Are you planning any new anthems this holiday season?

Alice Avouris: On Christmas Eve we're singing two new anthems picked up from a Hinshaw and GIA choral reading workshops at last summer's national convention. "Sing Noel" by Alfred E. Sturgis for SATB Chorus, a cappella, Hinshaw music, has got great rhythm, but I have to simplify it, because the soprano and bass both split into two parts. "Now the Heavens Start to Whisper" arr. by Nicholas Palmer for SATB and Organ with optional violin or string quartet, is a Welsh hymn set to beautiful words by Mary Louise Bringle, published by GIA.

Jeffrey Hoffman: We will be doing Eric Whitacre's *Lux Arumque* which is, of course SSAATTBB with a soprano solo. It is published by Walton Music, Inc. Not really new to us – we started it last Christmas, but we never performed it. Long story short, the choir wasn't quite ready for Christmas Eve last year. Another new piece for us will be Benjamin Britten's *St. Nicolas* and Ralph Vaughan Williams's *Fantasia on Christmas Carols* which we will be performing with my orchestra Sinfonia Celestis on December 12 at 4 pm. I hope to see some of my AGO colleagues at that concert! Tickets are only \$30 and will be available on our concerts web-site. We're in the middle of switching that to a new site, so I'll send a separate notice of it, soon, but for now the link (which sometimes doesn't work) will be <u>www.christchurchpelham.org/Concerts.html</u>

Joyce Gardner: At the late candlelight Xmas Eve service my choir processes while singing the Latin chant "Hodie Christus natus est" from Britten's *Ceremony of Carols* accompanied by random ringing of handbells as accompaniment. Sometimes we repeat it at the end of the service and process out and down the rear stairwell to the basement which creates a magical effect as the chant fades away.

Tim Keenan-Devlin: I am using a new anthem this year if it comes in! It's called "Christmas Hymn" - also known as "All This Night My Heart Rejoices," by Flor Peeters, published by Peters, for SATB and organ. I sang it with Jan-Piet Knijff's choir. Another anthem I'm using with my Youth Choir is "Night of Silence" by Daniel Kantor, unison, and able to be sung along with "Silent Night." They are both great pieces for Christmas.

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and here's another . . . Interview with a Board Member:

Janine Wallour-Thwaite received her Bachelors in Music from the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor in Texas. She is organist/choir master for St. Peter's Episcopal, Peekskill, New York; a wonderful, active church with many outreach programs and lots of musical traditions in the community. A teacher of piano, guitar and voice, she also enjoys directing the Tri-County Opera.

Alice Avouris: Janine, thanks for taking the time to do this interview. I think we all have a natural curiosity about other organists' musical backgrounds. Can you tell us about yours?

Janine Wallour-Thwaite: Roman Catholic elementary schools get a bad rap these days, but I attended a very good one, "St. Charles Borromeo" in Rochester, New York, with wonderful music teachers. Sister Mary Linus first noticed my singing voice and even talked me into leading the first class in song. Piano followed soon after.

Alice: I love that it so often starts with singing; our most portable instrument! Besides your teacher in elementary school, what other mentors did you have?

Janine: Because of my love for Bach, and the Mass, I developed a strong interest in becoming a "Lutheran organist". Dr. Richard Heschke (Concordia) was very helpful in my transition from being a choir director to playing the organ, also. He is a very patient man. My voice teacher at the University of Colorado, Jan Sullivan (she was a student of Berton Coffin) taught me technique that I still use today.

Alice: It sounds as though you were very lucky in having good teachers. As a teacher yourself, what do you think would be the most important advice you could give to an organist just starting out on their first job?

Janine: I think that a lot of people come to the organ as adults, and are very self-critical. You have to be willing to make mistakes -- perhaps even in public -- as you are learning.

Alice: Janine, you are a mother and a grandmother, and sometimes take care of your grandchildren during the day. It's a full life, and a challenge to always be professionally prepared.

Janine: By this time in human history, you would think that husbands and children would understand that if you are a musician, you have to practice. Parents have to develop a skill for planning their time that includes their own needs.

Alice: Organists and church musicians frequently use their other musical talents. Do you also find this rewarding?

Janine: It has been very rewarding to me to work on transposition - since I work with a lot of singers, and also arranging music. It is enjoyable to take a theme written for another instrument and arrange it for the organ. I still sing as much as I can. I play the guitar and often use it for children's choirs.

Alice: As organist for St. Peter's Episcopal, you play a traditional service with a certain amount of ceremony compared to other, newer traditions. There is also the challenge of a great variety of

possibilities in music. I also used to play for an Episcopal church, and it took me a while to get into the swing of things. Even so, last minute changes do occur, the bane of the organist!

Janine: I have had a variety of pastors who forget to tell you something important - especially when you're new at a position (like he completely changes the order of the service). I have gotten pretty good at mind reading. It helps to know the liturgy pieces very, very well. Sometimes in sung liturgies, the priest will enter on the wrong note - you have a choice as whether to follow him or her, or play it in the right key!

Alice: Thank you again, Janine, for sharing your story with us!
